WELCOME TO DENVILLE!


Construction is moving along at a rapid pace and our new Denville School is looking fabulous! We remain hopeful that we will move over the holiday break, we hope to celebrate a new year with a new school location. Celebrate the Children is happy to rejoin our schools and plant our roots in our new 70,000-square-foot building on Diamond Spring Road. The building will not only will allow us to share important resources, but also will provide our population with space needed to expand our educational programs to meet the diverse needs of our students.

The new campus will be divided into three wings: preschool/elementary, middle school and high school. There also will be a separate building for the adult program, including two apartments onsite. In addition to classroom space there will be dedicated art, music, science and yoga rooms, multiple sensory rooms and gyms, dedicated Floortime rooms, quiet work rooms, and multiple life-skills training environments.

Parents are welcome to attend an informational session at their child's current campus during this month to learn more about our move, hear about our wonderful new campus, any schedule changes, and our process on preparing the students and how you can support your child. A PEEK INTO THE CLASSROOM TIFFANY'S CLASS

Ms. Tiffany's class has definitely been enjoying the fall! We have been doing a lot of fall activities, lessons and crafts this month. In Science class we had a lesson on Apple trees and their life cycles. We cut open an apple and studied its parts and then learned about how the seed helps make a new tree. During the life cycle lesson, we talked about how the apple tree loses all its leaves in the fall. Because of this, a curious student asked about why trees lose their "Green Dye" in the fall so we had a side lesson on why leaves change color.

We also raked paper "leaves" in the classroom and then sorted them by color. We acted as Scientists and hypothesized what color leaves we would have more of. The majority of the class guessed Orange leaves and when we finished our sorting and counting we found that we had the most yellow leaves (orange was a very close second).

The class went on a nature hunt where we had to find certain fall items like a red leaf, an acorn, a pinecone, and a few other things. This was a big hit and the students had a fun time finding the items around the school property and in the woods behind the school. We had trouble finding pinecones, but one student found a coconut left under a pine tree! Each student brought their items back to class and they were used for our Thanksgiving Feast Centerpiece.

Volleyball!

Let's face it, Volleyball at CTC is fun! Here at CTC I use a giant hot air filled "Airlite" ball made of parachute material to make it even more fun. What the students don't know, shhhh, is that they are also learning. They're motor (muscle) learning, which is why my class is called Physical *Education* and not just "gym". The slower floating ball affords students more time to develop eye-hand coordination. As they track the ball moving toward them and then experience the action of pushing it away, they are increasing what Dr. Wachs and Weider refer to as Coordination of body's axes, and is defined below. Coordination of body's axes – Coordination of both sides of the body, upper and lower parts of the body and pivoting and twisting movements. Reciprocal interweaving of three main internal body axes: vertical, horizontal and transverse that control side-to-side, toward-away and clockwise-counterclockwise movements. Without an in depth knowledge of one's body axes, understanding and applying spatial coordinates and three dimensional concepts are difficult. These skills are vital to success in art, math, science, geography and industrial arts.
