

A PEEK INTO THE PROGRAM RELATED SERVICES

Meet Timocco!

The Related Services department is introducing a computer platform that will help integrate therapeutic goals into the classroom! Timocco is a virtual motion gaming system –similar to the Wii – that accelerates the development of motor skills, encouraging bi-lateral coordination, crossing midline, hand-eye coordination, postural control, visual thinking, visual tracking, and short-term memory. With over 50 games Timocco offers fun activities such as popping balloons, zapping aliens, catching calling fruit, playing goalie, and building train tracks and much more.

This gaming platform will be used both in therapy sessions and in the classrooms. Students will use their whole bodies to make things happen on the screen. While having fun they will be working on many of their therapy goals! Your child's therapy team will design the best gaming plan for your child, which will be carried out in the classroom. This gives an innovative way for students to work on therapy goals even when they are not in sessions with their therapists.

A PEEK INTO THE PROGRAM PHYSICAL EDUCATION

In Physical Education we're focusing on heart healthy activities like dance, jump rope and even hockey!

This month we began our unit on Family Life Education across the grades. Younger primary students are learning the following:

- General anatomy (eyes, arms, knees etc.)
- · Gender Identification -Correctly identify themselves and classmates as male or female
- Identifying which restroom to use in the community. Sign recognition
- Identifying strangers, acquaintances, friends, family members and helpers.
- · Identifying fair and unfair touches on general body areas
- Think First & Stay Safe school program

Older primary students are learning all about the above things plus:

- Identifying fair and unfair touches in private "bathing suit" areas. (Anatomy of these private areas is not included until middle school)
- Identifying a "tricky" person and learn what to do in a scary situation.

Older middle school students are learning about puberty, anatomy, and abuse prevention. Knowledge is power. Let's empower our kids to be safe! Please use the resources below to help your child in this effort.

RDI PARENT TRAINING

RDI and DIR have the same goal of addressing developmental goals and objectives for students. RDI was designed as a parent based intervention. RDI has hundreds of very specific, systematic, developmental goals that fit nicely within DIR's developmental levels.

The main difference you will likely see and feel initially, is that RDI begins with a more structured, parent or guide led approach. Our goal in RDI is to create opportunities for the child to become regulated through co-regulating with a parent or guide.

Once the child is able to actively and competently engage in the back and forth set up by the parent or guide, more responsibility is transferred to the child to maintain that coordinated activity. Aside from the initial way an RDI activity is set up, it is often difficult to discriminate between RDI and DIR once an activity is in motion.
